MINISTER'S LETTER FROM REV ROB ANNING

Blessed are the Peacemakers

I've just finished watching the 1pm News on the BBC. The first item was about the Memorial Service held at St Paul's Cathedral, for the 52 people killed and the 800 or so injured in the 7/7 bombings in London, 20 years ago.



The second item was about the flash floods in Texas, USA, where 81 people have died and many are still missing, including at least 10 children.

The third item was about an attempt to change employment law so that both parents whose child miscarries within 24 weeks of conception are entitled to unpaid bereavement leave.

All of this was before we got to an item about an attempt to bring peace to Gaza by having discussions about the conditions of a possible ceasefire between the US and Israel and Hamas.

In recent months, I am hearing more people say that they no longer watch the TV news. They simply can't face it and I am left wondering if this is a self-defence mechanism to avoid depression or is it a "cop out", an unwillingness to engage with the challenges that face us?

What is certain is that in the last 50 years or so, the accessibility to news items from around the world has increased through social media and other forms of digital information streams. Whereas many of the items of news in the past warranted three column-inches in the national newspapers about events that happened days or weeks before, now arrive into our lives as they are happening, and in vivid technicolour.

Nevertheless, Christians are still called to respond, not to ignore events, even if our attempts at response seem feeble and futile. Yes, we can all take the issues that bother us into a time of prayer, not to simply hand the problem over to God, but perhaps to request guidance and wisdom from God about how we should respond.

We can all write to our MPs, go on protest marches, hold discussions where various points of view are expressed, send letters to newspapers, and seek further information about the background to some of the issues so that our understanding is hetter

But while our responses may seem of little value about events on the other side of the world, we are all still called to be "peacemakers" wherever we live. In Matthew 5, Jesus says: "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be the children of God". In a recent article I read by Rev'd Inderjit Bhogal, a Methodist minister, he writes: "What this (children of God) means is that you most closely reflect the nature and character of God, the great Peacemaker, when you are a peacemaker".

Inderjit goes on: "In God's wisdom human beings are made in 'the Image and likeness of God', but not the same. Human beings are made in the Image of God but are marked by their immense differences. This is what makes us beautiful, but herein also lies the route to our brokenness. Brokenness and conflict arise when instead of valuing differences as gift and strength, they are seen as things to be feared and generate hostility. We can see this in all conflict in the world. Conflict arises when differences of appearance or opinions are seen as a problem rather than an enrichment".

So let's not despair at the news from around the world. Let's not bury our heads in the sand, but commit ourselves to learning more about each other. In that way we will fulfil the laws that Jesus gave us: "Love your neighbour" and "love your enemy and pray for those who persecute you".

Peace-making is about valuing differences and diversity of opinions, facilitating deep and respectful listening to all views without rubbishing or dehumanising or humiliating anyone.

CLARICE THOMPSON 1925-2025



Clarice was born in sunny Jamaica, and came to chilly England in 1955, when she saw snow for the first time in her life! She started working at Flavels, and then moved on to work as an Auxiliary Nurse, first at Warwick hospital, and then at the Midland Counties Home. She married a fellow Jamaican, Leroy Thompson, and in 1960 they bought a house in Camberwell Terrace, where they

raised five children together. Clarice was grandmother to twelve grandchildren and ten great-grandchildren. She was a part of the life of Radford Road (formerly Trinity Church) for many years, and was a woman of deep faith.

Clarice's life spanned a full century: she lived her whole life to the full, and for the last few years as her health was failing, she was lovingly cared for by her family, enabling her to stay in her own home, where she died peacefully at the age of 100.

Her funeral service was taken by Rev Rob Anning, with prayers, readings and tributes from family and friends. The mourners filled the church to overflowing! On display in the vestibule was this wonderful quilted fabric wall hanging with a picture of Clarice and her life story in her own words

MISSION PROJECT 2025/6



Each year we choose a new Mission Project for which to raise funds, with a target of £1000. From September 2025, our new Mission Project will be <u>MISSION AVIATION FELLOWSHIP</u>



Mission Aviation Fellowship is an international Christian organisation whose purpose is to bring help, hope and healing through aviation to people living in isolation and poverty.

Every 5.6 minutes a MAF aircraft takes off or lands somewhere in the world, transporting people who live in remote villages and assisting missions, churches, aid and development agencies and others working to transform the lives of communities that are cut off from the outside world.

SUE D'S ILLUSTRIOUS ANCESTOR: ST JOHN SOUTHWORTH

During one of our lively quiz debates at All Are welcome, Sue D told us about one of her distant relations, St John Southworth. This is a brief account of his interesting life, taken from the booklet written about him by Rev J L Whitfield

John Southworth was born in Lancashire in 1592 at Samlesbury Hall. At that period, there was an increasing amount of anti-Catholicism, but his family chose to pay heavy fines rather then give up their Catholic faith

John studied at the English College in Douai, in northern France. A law was passed In 1585 branding as treasonable any priest who dared to come back to England. The law was later extended to all who assisted such priests.

John was ordained priest before he returned to England 13 October

1619, where he remained until 1624. He was then recalled to serve as chaplain to Benedictine nuns in Brussels.

He returned to Lancashire, after about a year but was arrested in 1627 and imprisoned in Lancaster Castle along with Edmund Arrowsmith. Arrowsmith was hanged, drawn, and quartered at Lancaster on 28 August 1628. John was moved to The Clink in London where he was sentenced to death for professing the Catholic faith. In 1630, at the insistence of Queen Henrietta Maria, he and seventeen others were delivered to the French ambassador and deported to France.

By 1636 he had returned to England and lived in Clerkenwell, London, at this time there was a plague epidemic. He and Henry Morse ministered to the sick in Westminster, and also raised money for the families of victims. In 1637 Southworth was arrested again and sent to the Gatehouse Prison he was then transferred to The Clink again, where he remained for three years. On three occasions when was arrested, he was released by the Secretary of State Sir Francis Windebank at the direction of the Queen. The fourth time he managed to escape. From 1640 and 1654 he continued his clandestine ministry.

He was again arrested under the interregnum and was tried at the Old Bailey under Elizabethan antipriest legislation. He pleaded guilty to exercising the priesthood and was sentenced to be hanged, drawn and quartered. He was executed at Tyburn, London.


The Spanish ambassador returned his corpse to Douai for burial. His corpse was sewn together and parboiled, to preserve it. Following the French Revolution, his body was buried in an unmarked grave for its protection. The grave was discovered in 1927 and his remains were returned to England. They are now kept in the Chapel of St George and the English Martyrs in Westminster Cathedral, London.

In 1929 he was beatified. In 1970, he was canonized by Pope Paul VI as one of the Forty Martyrs of England and Wales. His feast day is 27 June which is celebrated in the Westminster diocese. He is a patron saint of priests.

In 2014, The Guild of Saint John Southworth was established in Westminster Cathedral. Its members are volunteers who will meet visitors, answer their questions and guide them around the cathedral if they wish.

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Who would have guessed we have such a well-connected member among our congregation!

Sally writes:

BOSHAM

Whilst on holiday in July, we were advised to visit the pretty village of Bosham., which we did on our way back from Chichester.

We are so glad we did. It really is very picturesque, with neat houses and beautiful gardens. It is a coastal village which readily floods. We were met with a road sign warning that the road floods and many of the houses had flood defences at their front gates and doors.

Bosham is reputed to be the oldest established Christian site in Sussex. We went into the village, Holy Trinity Church, which dates from the 10th century. To the right of the Saxon chancel we found a memorial stone, with the black raven of the Royal House of Denmark on it. The inscription reads:



TO THE GLORY OF GOD
AND IN MEMORY OF
A DAUGHTER OF KING CANUTE
WHO DIED EARLY IN THE 11TH CENTURY
AGED ABOUT 8 YEARS
WHOSE REMAINS LIE ENCLOSED IN A
STONE COFFIN BENEATH THIS SPOT
PLACED BY THE CHILDREN OF
THE PARISH AUGUST 1906

Tradition says that a young daughter of Cnut's (or Canute,) fell into the nearby millstream and drowned in the year 1020. The millstream is still there; and has been, apparently, since it was dug by the Romans



King Harold's association with Bosham is such that some believe he might have been buried in the church. The child's skeleton thought to be that of Cnut's daughter was originally discovered under the nave in 1865, but re-examined in 1954. At that time, another stone coffin was found nearby, which contained the remains of a man, about 5'6" tall, aged about 60, minus a head, leg, and part of the other leg. It has been speculated that these are the remains of Harold, last king of the Saxon English. It is not known what actually happened to Harold's mutilated body after the Battle of Hastings – William didn't want the English to create a shrine to their dead king and it is generally thought that Harold was discreetly buried at Waltham Abbey. But no one knows for sure. Indeed, it is not certain that the child's skeleton is that of Cnut's daughter either. It is known that under the nave is a privileged place to be buried and the right place to find a king's daughter – as well as, perhaps, a king.

Bosham Church is depicted in the Bayeux Tapestry, the embroidery commissioned by the Normans to tell their tale of the Battle of Hastings.
