MINISTER'S LETTER FROM REV TINA BROOKER

New Beginnings and God's Faithfulness

Dear friends,

Happy new Connexional year. I really enjoyed my first time worshipping with you recently. Even though Radford Road is two different denominations, it felt like one happy church family. It was a privilege to be there. Thank you for your very warm welcome and to Revd Nick who I'm looking forward to working with over the coming years.



I was recently reflecting how each year brings with it moments that invite us to make a fresh start. For many, the beginning of a new academic year is one of those seasons. There's something about fresh calendars, blank pages, and new opportunities that stirs both excitement and apprehension. Students prepare to step into unfamiliar classrooms, teachers ready themselves for fresh challenges, and families adjust to shifting routines. Even for those not tied to school runs, the rhythm of the year often feels like a fresh chapter, as the trees begin to turn and we sense the seasons shift.

In these moments of transition, the promises of the Bible speak with clarity and comfort. God tells His people in the book of Isaiah 43:19, "See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it?" New beginnings are not just human markers of time, they can be opportunities for us to see the hand of God at work.

Perhaps the greatest encouragement of all is found in God's daily renewal of mercy, "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases; His mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is Your faithfulness." (Bible). Each sunrise is proof that God is still present, still faithful, and still offering us the grace to begin again.

If you are looking for a new opportunity to find faith in God or to renew or rediscover your beliefs, Dale Street Methodist Church is running the Alpha Course, a chance to discover more about faith in a friendly, welcoming setting. HUNDREDS GATHER AT BOURNEMOUTH BEACH FOR MASS BAPTISM IN THE SEA

Hundreds of people have taken part in an outdoor service which saw 92 people baptised in the sea. Congregations from five churches across Bournemouth gathered next to Boscombe Pier for the event.

Peter Baker, senior minister at Lansdowne Church, led the ceremony described as a celebration of faith.



He said the public display was to "bring together Christians who believe in Jesus Christ and want to tell the world that"



Mr Baker said the church was "alive and kicking" in Bournemouth and it had seen a "quiet revival" post Covid. He said it felt like a festival and the churches were planning to do similar events in the future for people who were "unashamed" of their faith.

THE HOLY WELL, SOUTHAM

A fairly short walk around Southam will bring you to the Holy Well which is by the river Stowe. It has

been in existence for over one thousand years and was last renovated in 2005-7, when the site was restored with seats and a palisade fence with carvings designed by artist Will Glanfield as part of the Southam Stories project, paid for by the Heritage Lottery Fund.

It is thought to be the oldest recorded Holy Well in England, one reason for it being a holy well is due to its association with the legend of Saint Fremund, son of King Offa. Whilst praying after a



battle at Radford Semele, one of King Offa's commanders beheaded him. It is said Fremund carried his head some distance when a 'spring burst forth'. presumably the Holy Well. He washed his wounds, fell prostrate and died. His body was then taken to Offchurch to be buried.

The well is a Grade II Listed Building which was first recorded as part of the Manor of Southam in 998 and in the years since, the natural spring water has provided treatment for eye problems, probably because of its clear, clean nature compared with other local water sources. It is thought to be a reason why Henry Lilley Smith in 1818 developed his Eye and Ear Hospital in Southam, in the building, now a wedding venue, called Warwick House on Warwick Road, Southam.

The well is an unusual half-moon stone structure holding water, with three strange heads out of whose mouths the water flows down to the river. Its source of clean water was so important, that at the enclosure of Southam lands in 1760, the Holy Well was specifically mentioned to be enclosed by posts



and rails and kept for the benefit of the inhabitants of the Parish of Southam and not to be acquired privately. A footpath from the town was laid and the upkeep of the well still remains with the people of the town.

Sadly, according to an article written in 1855 in the Warwickshire Advertiser, it was in decline, and despite local attempts to clean it up, it remained in decline. Then in 1925 the water was diverted into a reservoir to provide water for Southam and Long Itchington, this resulted in reducing its flow to such an extent that it ran dry in drought periods.

In 1958, an article written in the Leamington Courier reported that Warwickshire County Council was going to pay half the £150 cost with the Parish Council for restoring the well. Brian Townsend in his book 'Southam Through the Centuries' in 1981 noted it was little more than a trickle, and it was still dry in 1991. However, the town in 2005 discovered why the water supply was poor and restored it, and with the help of the Heritage Lottery Fund the Holy Well was fully renovated as it is seen today.

MISSION PROJECTS



Our Mission Project last year was Embrace. During our service on Sunday August 10th, we were very pleased to welcome Rev Su McClellan, engagement lead of Embrace, who is based at Coventry Cathedral.

Margaret H presented her with our donation of £1000, after which Su gave a talk about the work




involved. It was very interesting but emotional to hear of the problems faced by the people in that part of the world, and the all the help that Embrace the Middle East can offer. Su has been out over 30 times. Before the current war began she has taken Embrace supporters on tours to see and understand the work that is done. At the end of her talk she asked that we continue to pray and act for Embrace.





Our Mission Project this year is MAF. Mission Aviation Fellowship is the world's largest humanitarian air operator. For over 75 years they have been flying light aircraft over jungles, mountains, swamps and deserts. CHARTERHOUSE, COVENTRY

Sally writes:

We visited Charterhouse in Coventry, a Grade I listed,14th century medieval monastic house surrounded by spacious green areas: 1.7 acres of walled garden surrounded by wildlife pond and community orchard, with the river Sherbourne running through the grounds. It is home to some of the finest examples of medieval and renaissance art in England.



Founded in 1381, Coventry Charterhouse has served many different purposes. From a 14th century monastery for a silent order of monks to a family home and later as a garden that produced exotic fruit for wealthy locals. Former notable inhabitants include Robert Dudley, famous favourite of Queen Elizabeth I, and John Whittingham who cultivated the nursery and walled garden for food production. In later years, the house has a whole new tale to tell, with members of the community coming together to save the building from sale and possible demolition. It is now open for the public to appreciate as a National Trust property.



In the Charterhouse you will find wall paintings over three floors of exceptional quality and national significance. The medieval depiction of The Crucifixion is the only surviving monumental painting from an English Carthusian priory, although incomplete due to building alterations, the paintings are some of the finest examples of medieval and renaissance art in England.

Whilst we were there, we were lucky enough to see the Helios Art installation. An illuminated 7 metre round sculpture by Luke Jerram made up from 400,000 photographs of the sun's surface. Gentle music played and lots of people lay underneath to enjoy the experience. The sculpture is currently touring the country.



Holiday Bible club gets underway in Leamington Spa

EVERY year for the past seven years, during the first week of August, about 100 children have met each day in the school hall of Trinity Methodist church in Leamington Spa to learn more about the Bible at the summer Bible club for children.

This year was no exception. With a three-hour morning programme scheduled to include games, squash and biscuits, Bible teaching, chorus-singing, sword drill, quizzes and plays, it was a hectic time to say the least.

With a team of about 15 teachers, as many helpers as possible and months of preparation, the leader starts the week.

The club at Trinity is usually led by the minister, the Rev Peter Burnett, but this year, because of illness, it was led by Mrs Rita Overing, a member of the church and leader of the Seekers club.

She explained: "The Bible club began seven years ago when we had the Rev Alf Baxter here. Where he got the idea from, I don't know – I think he had them before in another circuit.

"We have our own Sunday school children and children from the Sunday schools of churches around here. When we asked who went to church, about two-thirds did.

"It is an ideal opportunity to teach the stories of the Bible to those who don't hear them. I know Sunday school children come, but we still manage to reach a third who don't go anywhere."

Mrs Overing and her team take the names and addresses of the children and some follow-up work is done. In the past, there have been a good number of Asian children who attend, but this year a holiday scheme run by the community relations committee was on at the same time, so numbers were down.
